This Is The Way It Was

September Museum Report By Ken Murdock, Curator

This monthly photo column by Ken Murdock features railroad scenes of the past, a look back into railroading's history.



This 1946 freight room scene shows the variety of LCL goods being shipped via the Railway Express Agency. The round bushel crates are most likely fresh produce or citrus bound for northern markets. There are also many packages and steamer trunks being shipped. The depot agent made a commission on REA shipments from his depot and sometimes it exceeded his railroad pay. - *Alvin Lederer Facebook collection*



Less than Car Load (LCL) freight was a significant part of most railroad's business. One major commodity shipped from Florida were fresh flowers and ferns for floral arrangements. The REA facility at Jacksonville Terminal was one of the largest in the country and floral shipments were a major part of their business. In this 1948 scene, gladiolas are being loaded into an ACL express car for fast shipment to a northern market on the headend of a passenger train. - *Alvin Lederer Facebook collection*



In this scene, another load of LCL freight being placed on an ACL Railway Express Agency express car for expedited shipment to a northern market. Soon after this 1951 scene, President Eisenhower initiated construction of the Interstate highway system and jet passenger planes began arriving. LCL freight began moving by trucks and people began driving or flying to their destinations. In 1975, the REA was bankrupt and closed its doors forever. Now we have FEDEX and UPS moving much of their LCL via rail. - *Alvin Lederer Facebook collection*

We started off the month with a museum workday on September 6th, with Phil Cross, Jerry and Ginger Honetor and I participating. The Honetors travel to Winter Garden via the Florida Turnpike, from the south side of St. Cloud, and they got caught up in the heavy traffic caused by the mass exodus from south Florida due to hurricane Irma. They didn't arrive until about lunchtime. Phil and I continued hanging sheetrock and we almost finished. Phil and I had to take a construction break and load the caboose with items stored around the caboose that had the potential of becoming projectiles during the hurricane. Jerry continued with some library work, transferring items from the old to the new library. He also worked on the installation of a conduit for the cat5 cables to the router in the Roper Building. Ginger hosted in the afternoon but visitors were few and far between due to everyone shopping for last minute hurricane supplies.

Before Irma came thru, Phil Cross went by the museum and covered the computers and printers with plastic trash bags and David Rhea moved the trash and recycling containers inside. The museum fared well through the storm except for the Roper Building. The Roper Building had some roof damage from the wind but, thankfully, we had no apparent water infiltration. Power was restored the next day. During the hurricane, our museum neighbor, Pat Couture, owner of West Orange Glass, kept hearing a banging noise from the direction of our museum. Mr. Couture lives above his business immediately south of our caboose. He looked out of his back window to see the Roper Building's metal roof panels on the north side being raised up by the wind and then dropping back in place, causing the banging noise. He immediately called the city and they came by and witnessed it. Consequently, when Phil Cross notified them on Wednesday about some roof damage that he had observed, they were already aware of it and will be taking care of it soon. We were very fortunate to have a good neighbor who was looking out for us!

We resumed with our Wednesday workday on September 13th, with Phil Cross, Jerry & Ginger Honetor, Irv Lipscomb and me participating. Jerry & I finished pulling the cat5 lines thru the new conduit and had to call on Joe Lehmann's expertise to get the router and switch connected properly. Thanks Joe! Phil and I returned to hanging sheetrock and finished all of it. The next step is taping and mudding the joints. Jerry returned to the library and continued moving items from the old to the new library. Irv continued his work on inventorying the flat-files and then vacuumed some of the sheetrock debris that I made. Ginger worked on cleaning the showcases and hosted in the afternoon. She had very few visitors due to the aftermath of Irma.

Our monthly museum workday was held on September 16, and we had six members participating who included Phil Cross, Irv Lipscomb, Al Butler, Jerry & Ginger Honetor and I. Phil and Ginger took care of the housekeeping chores. Al and I unloaded and disassembled a temporary storage rack in the new work shop to make room for more old library shelves to be moved in to replace temporary ones. Al and I then unloaded the temporary shelves and moved them out of the room for disassembly. Phil, Al, Irv, Jerry and I then went to the old library and unloaded the shelves and removed fasteners holding them in place to prepare them for the move. We moved all of the shelves into the Roper Building but ran out of time before getting them installed. We did modify and reinstall the temporary storage rack over where the old library shelves will go, then reloaded it with a disassembled showcase. It will eventually go in the museum once the old library is removed. Jerry continued moving things from the old library to the new and Ginger hosted in the afternoon. It was another very productive day!

East Broad Top Owner Trying to Sell Railroad In One Piece

INDIANA, Pa. — "The East Broad Top is sleeping," Joe Kovalchick says.

Indeed, it's been five years since the legendary narrow-gauge railroad has operated for the public. The famed narrow-gauge coal hauler's modern-day owner, Kovalchick, says he's trying to find someone, some group or agency to buy the 33-mile railroad.

"I want to keep it together," he says. "It's important to maintain that."

He says he's had offers to buy the locomotives, but he doesn't want to sell them piecemeal. He said he had feelers out but so far, no offers.

There have been a handful of private runs since the railroad's popular 9-mile round-trips behind steam ended in 2011. Gas-electric car M-1 and one of the road's center-cab diesels have made runs for the annual Friends of the East Broad Top October gathering, and more recently, several EBT motor cars have made shorter trips.

However, during the EBT's hibernation, the Friends' organizations has kept up its work. Lee Rainey, the organization's president, says volunteers continue to preserve and stabilize buildings with monthly work weekends year-round and a full week of work in May. Kovalchick has partnered the Friends for this work.

"Major stabilization work was begun and is about half done on the freight house. Built in 1884, the freight house was in very precarious condition," Rainey says. In addition, Rainey says work on the foundry and the south end of the locomotive shop is complete. Another crew has been stabilizing the lumber shed, and much new window sash has been fabricated for installation in the blacksmith shop, roundhouse and other buildings. Work continues on the restoration of 1882 combine No. 14.

The East Broad Top Preservation Association, formed in 2010, operated the railroad for two years and was trying to raise about \$8 million to buy it. But, as of late 2017, it has succeeded only in purchasing the standard gauge former Conrail connection in Mount Union, Pa., and about four miles of the East Broad Top south to Aughwick, Pa. At present the standard gauge trackage is used for railcar storage. The association was able to secure a state grant to re-purpose part of the Mount Union interchange yard into a linear park and install new ties into a portion of the EBT yard. Attempts to reach the association were unsuccessful. Any attempt to re-open the railroad faces several major obstacles. Any one of the road's six steam locomotives would have to undergo a lengthy and expensive overhaul to meet federal regulations, and the track, which was getting rough when the line shut down in 2012, would require an unknown number of ties, amount of ballast and surfacing before it could handle regular trains. In addition, since it has been shut down for several years, a strong publicity and marketing effort would be necessary to bring in new riders.

Every Wednesday a small dedicated group of workers from the Central Florida Railway Historical Society converges on the Central Florida Railroad Museum to continue remodeling of the Roper Building. When completed, the space will house additional museum space, and a meeting room, library, workshop and office. The project is being financed entirely by Railway Society members' contributions. Donations from Society Members and the public will be received with great enthusiasm and gratitude.
